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For all its small size, 130 x 105 mm., George Knight's atlas has a rather grandiose title in which he describes himself as 'teacher of English, history, geography &c & author of a pronouncing dictionary &c.' The engraved title-page is signed by William Murphy, the man responsible for the sixty-four numbered maps. These are all single-page with outline hand-colour and they measure about 110 x 80 mm., with 'Drawn & Engraved by W. Murphy, Edinr.' at the foot. In his preface, Knight explains his system of teaching geography by the use of maps, with each one having an outline map without names exactly opposite, and this is the format of his atlas, with their titles in two-line panels:

The detailed maps on the verso have notes on areas and populations adjacent to their titles and often within the panels. The last few maps relate to the ancient world.
