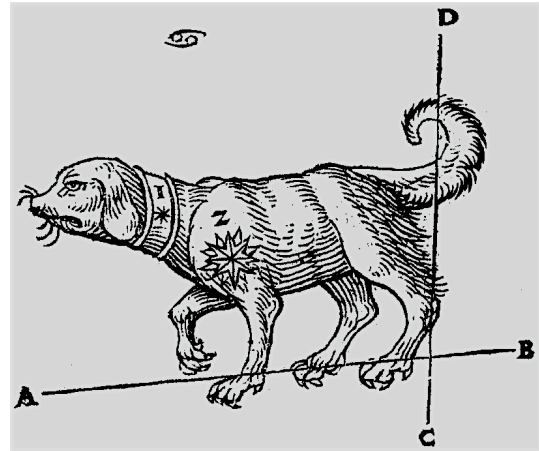
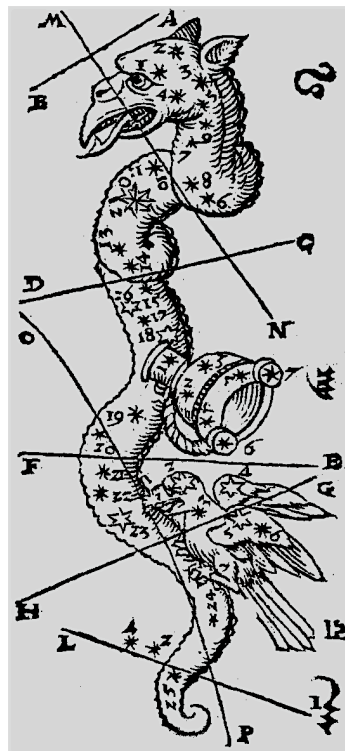

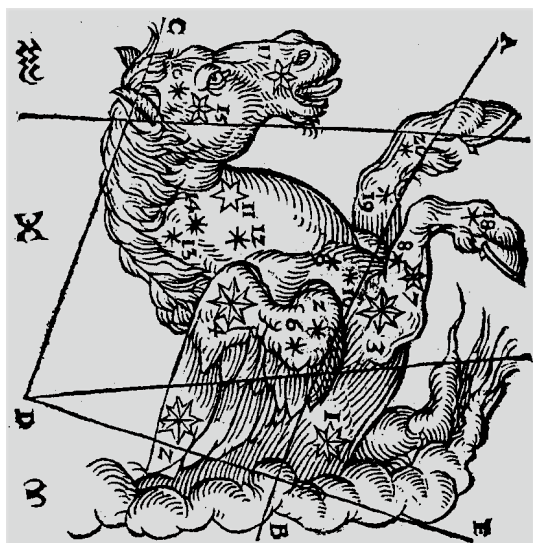

Some of these woodcuts are miniatures and a series of them appeared in a book on astronomy by Heinrich Decimator, a German theologian.

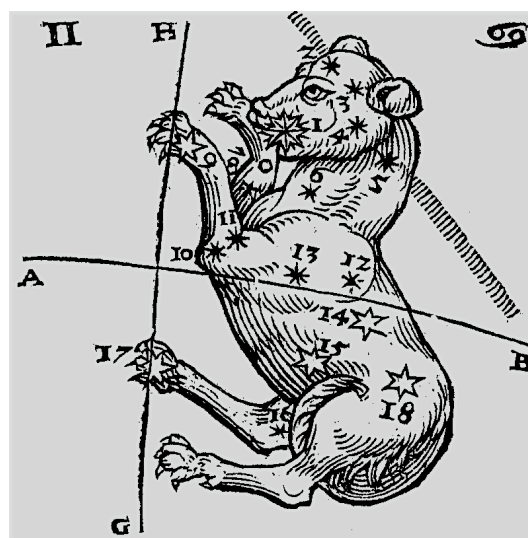
These celestial charts are without borders and with two exceptions (see below), they have a maximum size of 70 mm. square. There are forty of these illustrations:
