



Johann Praetorius printed and published volume two (*Auctarium*) of Gabriel Bucelin's *Universal history* but the imprints on the title-pages of the various sections indicate that he and Johann Görlinus were partners.

The final part is a world atlas with the title *Praecipuarum universi terrarum orbis*, which contains thirty scarce maps:

Europa; Asiae Superficialis descriptio; Africæ Descriptio; Americae Nova Descriptio; Artesia; Brabantiae; Flandriae compendiosa delineatio; Hollandiae superficialis descriptio; Daniae Typus; Polonia Compendiose descriptum; Polonia et pars Silesiæ; Lithuania Obiter adumbrata; Russia obiter delineata et adumbrata; Tartaria Sive Magni Chami Imperium; Andalvziae Descriptio; Portugalliae descriptio; Malta Olim Melita Insula; Siciliae Superficialis adumbratio; Neapolitani Regni Compendiosa Descriptio; Sabaudiae descriptio; Hiberniae Insulae Miraculis Naturalibus pro digiosæ delinatio; Candia olim Creta; Terra Sancta sive Palastina; Turci Imperii Advmbratio; Graecia olim Hellas nunc Romechi, Turcis Romechi; Natolia; Persarum Regni descriptio; Chinace Compendiosa descriptio; Japoniae Descriptio; India Orientalis.



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These ones are all copper plates about 105/8 x 63/6 mm., which complement the woodcuts in the earlier volume (see 1650) and again derive from the Ortelius miniatures. They were possibly engraved by Melchior Küsell, whose signature may just be deciphered at lower left on the engraved titlepage. Due to a binding error, the 1658 British Library copy contains the atlas of woodcuts. The New York Public Library has a separately bound copy of the atlas.

At least one plate, the map of Ireland, was retouched for 1664 and Bucelin's third volume appeared the same year (see 1664).
