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



They are thought to be some of the earliest work in England of the engraver Herman Moll and a few of the plates do have his signature. The set includes twenty unsigned miniatures after Pierre Du Val (see 1660), but with plain rectangular title panels:

Savoy; Franche Connty; Arabia; China; Tartary; Barbary; Malta; The Molvcca Isles; Isles of Japan; The Philippine Islands; Zanguebar; Monomotapa; Tercera, Islands; Canary, Islands; Islands of Cape Verd; Isle of Madagascar; New Mexico; Florida; New Spain; Guiana.

These are mostly about 115×98 mm., though some maps of groups of islands are smaller than the others (see below).
