


Johann U. Müller

Latin and German editions of a 1692 world geography by Johann Ulrich Müller have a double-page frontispiece or additional title-page (see below). This was engraved and signed by Gabriel C. Bodenehr of Augsburg, with different wording from the letterpress ones. He was also likely responsible for engraving the 103 tiny maps, about 77 x 64 mm.

They were printed at the top of the page, with letterpress below and plain backs. Seventy-two are after Johann Hoffmann (see 1678) and the rest relate to Germany. The series consists of a world map without a rectangular border, almost twice the size of all the others and folded in (plate I); fifty-two maps relating to Europe (plates II-LIII); sixteen to Asia (plates I-XVI); sixteen to Africa (plates I-XVI); eighteen to America (plates I-XVIII). A facsimile of the German edition was published in Leipzig in 1979.



Twenty-six maps have titles in cartouches or panels, nineteen have them on the face of the map and fifty-eight are untitled, relying on the heading of the letterpress below:







A decade later a re-titled and enlarged two volume German edition of Müller's book was published in Ulm and Frankfurt, with many changes including a modified engraved title-page. The plate numbers were altered and titles were also added to fifteen of the maps which did not have them. Sixty new ones were added, having slightly wider borders with a finer outer line, about 80 x 67 mm. A few† are signed 'G. Karsch sc.' (see below right) and he probably engraved them all. Forty-six of these relate to Europe and the other fourteen are 'ancient' ones after the Elzevirs' miniatures of Philip Clüver (see 1659a). The titles of all but three of the new maps are in panels or cartouches:

An unverified edition, published in Ulm by Georg W. Kühnen in 1708, is cited by Emile van der Vekene in his *Les Cartes géographiques du Duché de Luxembourg*, 2nd edition, published in Luxembourg by Krippler-Muller in 1980.

At an unknown date all 163 plates were also printed without any text to produce a miniature atlas measuring about 85 x 90 mm. Its engraved pictorial title-page was printed from the lower half of the original plate, as modified for the 1702 editions. This involved adding 'Atlas minor sive' to the pedestal above the title and also replacing the imprint with the words 'juncta simul Geographia antiqua'. It may be that this atlas, which is a rare item today, was issued by Kühnen shortly before or after 1702.
