


In the introduction to his world atlas (see 1759) Louis Alexandre Du Caille promised that if it was favourably received by the public he would then each year produce further volumes relating to France, Germany, Flanders, America and other parts of the world. The first of these appeared the next year but there were no others published afterwards. Both are usually found in beautiful bindings with gilt endpapers and the maps in outline colour. Sometimes the two were bound together.



His atlas of France has a title-page engraved by Pierre Philippe Choffard and contains thirty one maps about 120 x 100 mm., all engraved by Jean Lattré and numbered: a, No. 1.b, No. 1.c and No. 2 - No. 29, though 16 & 27 (see above) are not numbered and 24 is numbered 23 in error. Only the first map of Paris is dated 1761 but four are signed using the form 'Ducaille' and the title of the map of France includes his initials. Most of the titles are rather long but mainly relate to generalités:

France; Paris; Paris; Soissons; Amiens; Châlons; Orleans; Tours; Bourges; Moulins; Lyon; Riom; Poitiers; Limoges; Bourdeaux; La Rochelle; Montauban; Auch; Rouen; Caen; Alençon; Toulouse; Montpellier; Lorraine Barrois et Metz; Bourgogne ou Dijon; Franche Comté; Dauphiné; Provence; Bretagne ou Nantes; Alsace; Roussillon.
