

During the eighteenth century there were few miniature county maps published in England until the arrival of *Cary's Traveller's companion* in 1790, with miniatures as plain, accurate, clear and finely engraved as the rest of his work. Thereafter, there was a vogue for pocket county atlases with maps after Cary, though today many of these are quite uncommon and one or two are rare. A series of this type appeared in a short-lived monthly magazine published in London 'for youth of both sexes' and edited by Dr. William F. Mavor. There were only twelve issues, the first on Friday, February 1st, 1799 and only nine maps were printed:

England and Wales; Bedfordshire; Berkshire; Buckinghamshire; Cambridgeshire; Cheshire; Cornwall; Cumberland; Derbyshire.
