


The second of Walter McLeod's pocket atlases was published two years after his first and it seems to have been only issued once, unlike the first one (see 1854a). They were both sold either at two shillings and sixpence in printed limp covers, or three shillings half bound. The maps were again numbered tinted lithographs with small double-page ones of Europe, the British Isles, Asia and the World, and thirteen single-page ones, the first five of these measuring about 70 x 30 mm:

The World on the plane of the horizon of London; Physical map of North America; Physical map of South America; Physical map of Africa / Australia &c.; Map showing the distribution of active volcanoes and the regions visited by earthquakes.



The other eight are thematic world maps of 107 x 71 mm:

Geographical distribution of the most useful minerals; Isothermal lines of the month of January; Isothermal lines of the month of July; Map showing the distribution of the winds; Map showing the distribution of rain & snow over the World; Geographical distribution and limits of cultivation of some of the principal plants most useful to man; Geographical distribution and range of some of the principal members of the animal kingdom; Distribution of the leading races of man.

All are finely done and signed by Edward Weller.
