There was an increasing demand for school textbooks in England and Wales following the 1870 Education Act and a considerable number of these was produced in London by George Gill. His output included many geographical works which contained a large variety of maps including lots of miniature ones.

One publication measuring only 135×105 mm. was an atlas, having blue printed paper covers with the title in a globe, a contents list and imprint all printed on the front. It contains twelve wood engraved maps without numbers or colour:

The World*; Europe; England (physical)*; England (political)*; England (railways)*; Scotland*; Ireland*; Asia; Africa; North America; South America; Australia and adjacent islands.

The first measured only 85 x 45 mm., whereas the rest are $75/85 \times 93/115$ mm. A soft cover booklet selling for two pence included just six* of the same maps.
