
It seems a one shilling set of pictorial educational cards, about  $110 \times 80$  mm., was a joint enterprise and issued in a printed wrapper by the firm of Raphael Tuck: fine art publishers of London, New York, Paris & Berlin. However, it was produced by Jean L. Bognard of Paris (see 1883), who also issued it as scholar-reward cards and produced a set of the French departments in the same style (see 1885a). The cards are decorated with miniature county maps of the whole of the British Isles, having several counties on each one with their names printed across them in sans serif capitals, but there are few titles:

Connaught; Ireland. Province of Ulster; Ireland. Province of Munster; Ireland. Province of Leinster.



These twenty two scarce chromolithographic maps have the counties in various colours: blue, pink, yellow and green, with purple reserved for London and Carlow in Leinster but orange just for Kent. They are surrounded with sepia vignettes of local buildings or views and have topographical notes on the back.
